

Section 1

Background Information



a. Introduction

The Disability Sector Training; an Information Resource for Disability Services, presents an overview of training resources for the disability sector in Western Australia, focussing on training requirements for direct care staff.

This resource was developed through the NDS Training Steering Committee which was established to implement Recommendation 44 of the Accommodation Blueprint Report. The report states: 'In order to maximize the current training resources within the sector, an across-sector working group be formed to develop a more integrated and coordinated approach to training.'

The NDS Training Steering
Committee, chaired by Debbie
Karasinski (CEO SENSES
Foundation), identified a need to
urgently develop a process to help
keep the disability sector up to
date with a comprehensive listing
of training providers and resources.

To this end the NDS Training Steering Committee have developed:

- Disability Sector Training; an Information Resource for Disability Services
- an online training calendar at <u>www.ideaswa.net</u>; and
- an online information list of training providers and other general resources at www.ideaswa.net.



b. Understanding Training

Training, of support workers by West Australian Disability Service providers tends to fit into three broad categories.

- Nationally Recognised Training

 This is training and qualifications attained through Registered Training
 Organisations (RTO) (including TAFE and private organisations). These qualifications are derived from the Community Services
 Training Package and the following qualifications are available for people working in the disability sector across Australia.
 - CHC30302 Certificate III in Disability Work
 - CHC40302 Certificate IV in Disability Work
 - CHC40202 Certificate IV in Service Coordination
 - CHC50102 Diploma in Disability Work

(NB. The names and structure of these qualifications are likely to change early 2008 depending on the review of the Community Services Training Package.)

2. Other Accredited Training There are a range of specific
qualifications used by the
disability sector that are
accredited, however these may
be outside the Nationally
Recognised Qualifications
(issued by a RTO). Nevertheless
accredited courses may be
recognised around Australia.

Examples of this type of accredited training include manutention, first aid and physical assault response training.

 Non-Accredited Training – This includes a diverse range of specifically designed workshops for disability agencies. A certificate of attendance may be provided.



c. Methods of training

Training is available in ways that are more flexible and responsive than the traditional "classroom" style. For example;

- Training workshops
- On the job training
- Online Training
- Self paced learning
- Computer based training
- Video and audio training program

An organisation can download a range of training resources from the internet and adapt to their own needs.

d. Understanding Nationally Recognised Training

Nationally Recognised Training is delivered through a Registered Training Organisation (RTO). The Community Services Training Package contains the qualifications for disability work. RTO's must use qualified workplace assessors to conduct assessment of trainee's competencies.

For information on Registered Training Organisations for disability work qualifications go to the National Training Information Service (NTIS) at www.ntis.gov.au

Any organisation can become an RTO in Western Australia, if it meets the requirements set by the Training Accreditation Council (TAC) however there is a set up cost. RTOs can be commercial organisations, government funded organisations such as TAFE, or community organisations. To find out how to become a RTO go to the TAC website at www.tac.wa.gov.au.

Disability Service Providers often work in partnership with Registered Training Providers to achieve outcomes tailored to the organisations needs.

e. Traineeships

A traineeship is a full-time or part-time employment based training arrangement. During the course of a traineeship, a trainee gains work experience and has the opportunity to learn new skills in a hands-on environment. On successful completion, the trainee earns a nationally recognised qualification. In Western Australia, traineeships are available for existing workers and new trainees. 
